## Parable of the Growing Seed

<sup>26</sup> Jesus also said, "The Kingdom of God is like a farmer who scatters seed on the ground.

Night and day, while he's asleep or awake, the seed sprouts and grows, but he does not understand how it happens.

<sup>28</sup> The earth produces the crops on its own. First a leaf blade pushes through, then the heads of wheat are formed, and finally the grain ripens.

<sup>33</sup> Jesus used many similar stories and illustrations to teach the people as much as they could understand.

<sup>34</sup> In fact, in his public ministry he never taught without using parables; but afterward, when he was alone with his disciples, he explained everything to them.

<sup>17</sup> This means that anyone who belongs to Christ has become a new person. The old life is gone; a new life has begun!

### Words from Rev Geoff Discerning the Will of God

This weekend we welcome the Reverend Patty Lawrence to Tamworth. She will be conducting the Mandatory Ethics training for Ministers Pastors and Lay Leader in our resbytery on Saturday. On Sunday she is preaching at Tamworth Southside Uniting and talking about the formal process by which the UCA seeks to discern the gifts and ministries to which its members are called by God. Without stealing her thunder the, a Period of Discernment (POD) is the process approved by the National Assembly in 1997 to enable the church and individuals together, to discern God's call on their life for future ministry and where our individual ministry lies. This program helps you articulate specific questions you are discerning about your call to ordained or specified ministry. The process is meant to be deeply personal and involves both your own sense of God's call and the Church's discernment of your gifts and graces. It's an invitation to encounter, grow, and practice within the context of God's ministry and mission in the church and the world.

The issue of discernment constantly confronts both the leaders of our Church Councils and each of us individually. How are we as a congregation to discriminate and make decisions that are faithful to God. Currently, the Joint Nominating Committee is seeking to discern whom God might be calling to be the second Minister in the Tamworth Regional Uniting Churches. Members of the congregation will have an opportunity to share in that discernment on 23 June at our various Congregation meetings. At an individual level you may be trying to discern whether you continue in a leadership role within the Church for another year or you may be trying to discern whether you put your name forward for a vacant leadership position.

The readings set down for Sunday warn about judging on the basis of outward appearances and declare that the people of God are given eyes that enable them to discern in new and different ways. The ways are not spelt out in detail but that is the way faith operates. It never functions without a level of risk.

When it comes to discerning God's presence in human history, Christins are not to be content with worldly symbols and outward appearances. The cross of Christ is the ultimate lens through which we are to look.

### From little things... Morgan Freeman

Honored with, the Screen Actors Guild Life Achievement Award in 2018, recognising his career achievement and humanitarian accomplishments.

Freeman is the force behind several humanitarian and charitable initiatives. He established the Tallahatchie River Foundation in his home state of Mississippi with his daughter, Morgana Freeman, to promote quality early childhood education for underserved youth. In response to the devastation caused by Hurricane Ivan in 2004, he formed the Grenada Relief Fund to help those affected. Since renamed PLANIT NOW, the organisation continues to provide resources needed to prepare for natural disasters.

He is a member of the Board of Directors of Earth Biofuels, a company whose mission is to promote the use of clean-burning fuels. He also supports Artists for a New South Africa and the Campaign for Female Education.

Freeman has been named on the Forbes "Most Trustworthy Celebrities" list each of the five times it has been published since 2006.

There is a theory that if bees were to become extinct then the entire population of humankind would be wiped out within four years. Upon hearing this potentially devastating fact, Morgan Freeman decided to do his bit to help. In 2014, he converted a 124-acre ranch he owns in Mississippi into a dedicated bee sanctuary. It's not known exactly how many bees live on the ranch, but it could be up to two million.

Freeman has promised that he has no intention of harvesting honey. In fact, the only time he visits the hives is to bring food. He also trusts the bees so much that he never wears a beekeeping suit or hat.


