Jesus Feeds Five Thousand

The apostles returned to Jesus from their ministry tour and told him all they had done and taught.

³¹ Then Jesus said, "Let's go off by ourselves to a quiet place and rest awhile." He said this because there were so many people coming and going that Jesus and his apostles didn't even have time to eat.

³² So they left by boat for a quiet place, where they could be alone.

³³ But many people recognized them and saw them leaving, and people from many towns ran ahead along the shore and got there ahead of them.

³⁴ Jesus saw the huge crowd as he stepped from the boat, and he had compassion on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So he began teaching them many things

Ephesians 2:11-22 (NLT)

Oneness and Peace in Christ

¹¹ Don't forget that you Gentiles used to be outsiders. You were called "uncircumcised heathens" by the Jews, who were proud of their circumcision, even though it affected only their bodies and not their hearts.

¹² In those days you were living apart from Christ. You were excluded from citizenship among the people of Israel, and you did not know the covenant promises God had made to them. You lived in this world without God and without hope.

¹³ But now you have been united with Christ Jesus. Once you were far away from God, but now you have been brought near to him

through the blood of Christ.

¹⁴ For Christ himself has brought peace to us. He united Jews and Gentiles into one people when, in his own body on the cross, he broke down the wall of hostility that separated us.

¹⁵ He did this by ending the system of law with its commandments and regulations. He made peace between Jews and Gentiles by creating in himself one new

people from the two groups.

¹⁶ Together as one body, Christ reconciled both groups to God by means of his death on the cross, and our hostility toward each other was put to death.

¹⁷ He brought this Good News of peace to you Gentiles who were far away from him, and peace to the Jews who were near.

¹⁸ Now all of us can come to the Father through the same Holy Spirit because of what Christ has done for us.

A Temple for the Lord

¹⁹ So now you Gentiles are no longer strangers and foreigners. You are citizens along with all of God's holy people. You are members of God's family.

²⁰ Together, we are his house, built on the foundation of the apostles and the prophets. And the cornerstone is Christ Jesus himself.

²¹ We are carefully joined together in him, becoming a holy temple for the Lord.

²² Through him you Gentiles are also being made part of this dwelling where God lives by his Spirit.

Words from Rev Geoff A Reflection on the 17 th UCA Assembly.

The world is full of walls. There are fences, gates, partitions and barriers all aimed at keeping something or someone in or out. We need walls to protect us from the weather and hostile intruders, and to improve organization and efficiency. But walls, both literal and spiritual, can lead to grief, division and even violence. All walls serve a purpose, but not all walls serve the purposes of God. In Ephesians 2 we read that Christ has "broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us"; If we are to live this message as members of the UCA in an era where hostility is on the increase, then we need to confess our contribution to the building of walls out of the raw materials of sin and division and the glue of labeling and prejudice.

As I look at the reports emanating the 17 th Assembly of the UCA I am encouraged by the seriousness at which our Church is seeking to proclaim a gospel of peace and reconciliation. The theme of "Weaving Threads of Love." chosen by our President, the Reverend Charissa Suli, is a vision for a multicultural church that is being woven together by faith in the reconciling love of Christ. Ngarrindjeri man Sean Weetra from the UAICC Congress challenged members of the Assembly and the wider Church to ensure the covenant between First and Second Peoples is more than just words, but a living breathing, commitment to equity and partnership.

The Reverend Dr Paul Dongwon Goh our President-Elect is currently Justice & CALD Multicultural and Cross-Cultural Officer in SA. He has served the Assembly as Advocate of the Being a Multicultural Church Circle The Assembly gave thanks to God for the work and witness of the National Council of Churches in Australia (NCCA) over the last thirty years. NCCA facilitates the Faith and Unity Commission, the Churches Refugee Taskforce, the Churches Ecological Taskforce, and Act for Peace.

The Assembly resolved to "invite congregations and councils of the Church to welcome and honour transgender, gender diverse, and intersex people, and the gifts and skills they bring to all aspects of the Church's life, including worship, leadership, and social justice advocacy."


Ephesians reminds us that Unity is not manufactured by human hands busy trying to pursue multiculturalism and tolerance. Peace is not just a ceasing of conflict or the absence of violence. Ephesians teaches us that unity and peace are not things at all; they are a person. Christ is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall. In Christ's death on the cross, peace has been achieved and hostility has been crucified that we may be reconciled to God and our neighbour.
