¹³ If you are wise and understand God's ways, prove it by living an honourable life, doing good works with the humility that comes from wisdom.

¹⁴ But if you are bitterly jealous and there is selfish ambition in your heart, don't cover up the truth with boasting and lying.

We are on the road again headed to Jerusalem teaching and preparing the disciples for what lays ahead, yet Jesus still did not want anyone to know. However, this time around, he tells them exactly what lies ahead. It is interesting here in the Mark's account that whenever Jesus talks about his suffering ahead of time, it all happens in the third person... "he" "Son of Man" etc. Scholars have dubbed this as the 'Messianic Secret' and I wonder if the reason was because Christ was uncomfortable talking about it in a direct way. A short way of removing the extra stress that he will be the victim.

One of the most amazing things about the gospels, especially Mark, is that they do not hesitate to present the disciples as clueless. These men are later to be apostles, sent out by Jesus to proclaim the gospel. They held places of honour and respect, and several of them died as martyrs. If the gospels were written to impress, the disciples would certainly have been presented in a different light.

Mark says that they didn't understand what Jesus was saying, but they also didn't dare to ask him any questions about it.

Does that sound familiar? Ever been in a situation in which a discussion was going on that was over your head, but you didn't dare to ask what it was all about? They all wanted to look like good students to Jesus.

As they are walking along, they begin to argue about who is the greatest. Which one is really Jesus' right-hand man? Which one stands out as the most worthy and devoted disciple? The saying, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." That is decidedly not the way things work in the world. People do not get ahead by making sure they are last in line. People do not rise to the top of the heap by making sure they have served everyone else first. This is not an answer about human wisdom, it's an answer about the Kingdom of God.

However, many times we may have heard that statement, it's impossible not to find it impractical and perhaps even offensive. Things just don't work that way in the real world. It's a way for being left behind and taken advantage of. So, taking the last place and being a servant of all is not being a coward. It has more to do with strength than weakness. The attitude of servanthood is the mark of a person who knows who he or she is. Such a person is not ignorant of their worth but knows their true worth. It comes from the heart of a person who knows she is loved and valued, who is deeply aware of his identity. The more we become identified with Jesus Christ and sure of God's love, the more we will be able to drop the claim of greatness and assume the role of servanthood.

Jesus was not a guru for modern corporate leadership theory, but it's interesting how his concept of servanthood has been picked up in some leadership circles. Servant leaders lead by putting others ahead of themselves. Their authority is the biproduct of their love for others. Others follow them because they know that in doing so, they will not be abused or abandoned, but because they know their welfare, success, and wellbeing are the focus of their leader's concern.

It allows the recipient to experience the kindness without feeling indebted or obligated to reciprocate publicly. It also prevents the act from becoming tainted by perceptions of ulterior motives.

It keeps us grounded and reminds us that the value of an act lies in the impact it has, not in the recognition it receives.


