Jesus Heals Blind Bartimaeus

⁴⁶ Then they reached Jericho, and as Jesus and his disciples left town, a large crowd followed him. A blind beggar named Bartimaeus (son of Timaeus) was sitting beside the road.

⁴⁷ When Bartimaeus heard that Jesus of Nazareth was nearby, he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!"

⁴⁸ "Be quiet!" many of the people yelled at him.

But he only shouted louder, "Son of David, have mercy on me!"

⁴⁹ When Jesus heard him, he stopped and said, "Tell him to come here." So they called the blind man. "Cheer up," they said. "Come on, he's calling you!"

Bartimaeus threw aside his coat, jumped up, and came to Jesus.

51 "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asked.

"My Rabbi," the blind man said, "I want to see!"

⁵² And Jesus said to him, "Go, for your faith has healed you." Instantly the man could see, and he followed Jesus down the road.

Words from Rev Geoff Seeing More Clearly

Blindness can be more than physical. In this Sunday's gospel reading (Mark 10:46-52), a blind person named Bartimaeus sought Jesus out for a cure, because he could "see" in Jesus what his followers could not, a chance for change. Sometimes life just looks grey. The outlook of our world and our situations can be the colour of gloom when we take an honest view. For instance, when you visit a loved one or a member of the congregation in ICU it can feel so harsh and hopeless. Especially if you see only the grey, drab, cold metallic surroundings. I was feeling like that when I visited a woman who had sought refuge in Australia from an African genocide. When I asked how she was feeling, she shared with me how she saw so many signs of God's merciful provision through the metal contraptions that beep and buzz and God's beauty in every caregiver.

When our eyes are grateful, we see grace. Life can look ugly or beautiful. Our world can appear like dark clouds will swallow it or like the morning sun is just about to break through. We can perceive the world as out-of-control or under God's control. We can look at our lives —at our circumstances — as draining, depressing and desperate or we can look a little deeper and see mercy, provision and hope. That's what Bartimaeus saw in Jesus. Mercy, provision and hope.

When Jesus heals people who are blind. He's giving them more than just physical sight; he's opening their eyes so that that can see more deeply. We ask for sight don't be surprised if your eyes shift from seeing through familiarity to wonder, through paranoia and self-protection to metanoia (repentance) and nurture, through envy to admiration and, through anger to forgiveness.

As soon as Bartimaeus' sight was restored, he "followed Jesus on the way." In other words, he became a disciple. He joined that group of disciples on their way to Jerusalem. This Sunday we rejoice as a family who have come to us all the way from Northen China to be baptised into the faith and family of Jesus Christ.

In the 1960s and 70s, when he was perhaps the biggest movie star in the world, **Steve McQueen** would demand free items in bulk from studios as a condition of appearing in their films, usually regular, day-to-day items like blue jeans, electric razors, and other common hygiene products. McQueen would then donate the items to the California Junior Boys' (a reform school in Chino Hills, California).

As a troubled youth who had endured a tumultuous, abusive childhood, and had numerous brushes with the law beginning as early as age 9, McQueen had been remanded to the school by his mother and stepfather as a teen, and credited it with helping him turn his life around.

He was also known to visit the school periodically to spend time talking to the boys and playing pool with them, even after becoming a star.

McQueen was not a saint — he absolutely had his vices and his unlovely character traits — but he wasn't all bad.

EDIT: To the people asking why he didn't use "his own money" for charity, um, he did. The items were part of his negotiated salary, and none of the studios had to provide them if they didn't really want to.

More importantly, McQueen also donated his time to the boys at the school, which to me is more valuable than money.

Any rich person can throw money at a cause, they do it every day. They don't all actually hang out with troubled kids and try to make a personal, positive impact on them.

The boxes will go to Sydney, where they will be checked, and then forwarded on to children in 3rd world countries, who would never otherwise receive a Christmas present.


Thank-you to everyone who has contributed towards the boxes. You are helping to make God's love real to children in need.
